I continue my thanks with the NCLR editorial and office staff. I start with Art Director Mary Thiesen, whose talent has brought national attention to NCLR (see this issue's NC Newsbriefs regarding our recent award). Senior Associate Editor Lorraine Robinson has come to the rescue once again this year, this time with an article for the "NC Food Finds" section we've announced but not yet received submissions for. She enjoyed tasting and reviewing the food so much that she plans to write regular such columns (but we still welcome additional submissions from readers). The selections of our new Poetry Editor Jeff Franklin and our outgoing Fiction Editor Luke Whisnant come together to give this issue's readers a particularly strong creative section. And finally, this issue was produced with the day-to-day service of Senior Assistant Editor Kim Cox, as well as the other student staff members and editorial board members (listed in front matter), while the services of Assistant Editor Randall Martoccia, Subscriptions Manager Kim Seavey and Submissions Assistant Dennis Turner allowed us to keep the editorial staff's attention on the issue at hand. In celebration of his 100th birthday, this issue's second special feature section is on Thomas Wolfe. For this section, Martha Morgan has provided an interview with the daughter of Wolfe's influential teacher Margaret Roberts; Robert Morgan commemorates Wolfe in verse; and John Idol compares Wolfe's autobiographical fiction with that of Pat Conroy, within which article you'll find a note regarding Pat Conroy's screenplay of *Look Homeward, Angel*.

As we announced in the last issue, our website is up, thanks again to Sally Lawrence, Luke Whisnant, and the ECU English Department. It is still at the "functional" stage – providing the necessary information to subscribe, submit, or purchase back issues. Extra photographs from back and current issues, the NC Writers database, and details about the contents of back issues are being added as staff and time allow.
