In the Company of Other Writers: An Interview with Marjorie Hudson

Marjorie Hudson was born in a small town in Illinois, raised in Washington, DC, and now lives in rural North Carolina. A North Carolina Arts Council Fellowship recipient, Hudson has published stories, essays, and poems in five anthologies and many magazines and journals, including the first edition of the North Carolina Literary Review. She is the author of Searching for Virginia Dare, a North Carolina Arts Council Notable Book, and Accidental Birds of the Carolinas, a short story collection that received many honors, including a PEN/Hemingway Honorable Mention for Distinguished First Fiction. Both books explore the theme of newcomers encountering the South.¹

Hudson leads workshops at Meredith College and Doe Branch Ink, and her private Kitchen Table Workshops have run continuously since 2009. A popular speaker for the North Carolina Humanities Council Road Scholars program, Hudson lectures on the life and work of slave poet George Moses Horton, the history and myth surrounding America's first English colony, and the mysteries of "mosaic writing." The thirty-minute drive south to Fearrington Village to meet with Marjorie Hudson felt familiar.
