 - Pay close attention to details
- Ingenuity:
 - Determine how to best complete your work accurately and efficiently
- Professionalism:
 - Be mindful of shared workspace
 - Correspond with writers and other important members of the literary community
 - Conduct yourself in a positive manner at events

Email the Editor: bauerm@ecu.edu

- To start your internship experience, construct an email to the editor, in the form of a job application letter that addresses why you want to be an intern.
 - Include the name of a reference, preferably an English instructor at ECU (easier for the editor to consult quickly for a fast turnaround).
 - Attach a writing sample, preferably one with a bibliography or works cited, which shows you understand about citing sources, but if you are a creative writer, you can also include a sample of your own work.
- PROOFREAD (You will be doing a lot of emailing with writers, and the editor wants to see an example of your professional correspondence.)

This letter is largely a means of showing your writing skills, as you will be corresponding with writers during the internship.

Wrap Up

- Serving on the staff of *NCLR* is very demanding.
- Some may tell you it's too demanding.
- Others will tell you it's demanding but rewarding.
- Your experience will depend on *your*:
 - Attitude about your role
 - Dependability on the job
 - Responsibility as a staff member
 - Conscientiousness about your work
